

ILLEGAL CONTENT

SeLogger can not physically carry out a general monitoring of listings for rental properties which it hosts and cannot determine the legal or illegal nature of these properties.

This situation has been confirmed in Article 6-I-7 of Law No. 2004-575 of 21 June 2004 regarding trust in the digital economy.

However, SeLogger is responsible for implementing a system to allow any individual to report any content which may include offences referred to in the fifth and eighth paragraphs of Article 24 of Law of 29 July 1881 regarding the freedom of the press and article 227-23 of the Penal Code, namely:

- apologist arguments for crimes against humanity
- incitement of racial hatred
- child pornography

As such, if you see a listing hosted by SeLogger, all or part of the content of which could be thought to include such an offence or, more generally, to be clearly illegal, please report it via our form: <https://amivac.com/en/contact-us>

For easier claim processing and so as to comply with the provisions of Article 6-I-5 of Law No. 2004-575 of 21 June 2004, you are asked to provide the following information:

- your full name, date, place of birth and postal address if you are a natural person;
- the company name, legal status, SIRET, registered address and name of the legal representative if you are a legal entity;
- the date on which the listing in question was reported or the number of the listing(s) in question;
- the URL(s) of the listing(s) in question;
- a description of the content of the listing(s) in question which you consider to be illegal (and ideally a copy of this content) and the reason for its illegality.

In this context, you agree not to abuse this facility, and if you do, you acknowledge and agree that you are liable to criminal prosecution, under the provisions of Article 6.4 of Law No. 2004-575 of 21 June 2004 according to which: "The act, by any person, of presenting the persons mentioned in 2 (hosts) with any content or activity labelled as illegal in order to obtain the withdrawal or to stop the publication of such, when he/she knows this information to be inaccurate, is punishable by one year's imprisonment and a fine of €15,000."
